### SECTION 1: VEGETABLES and FRUITS

1. All exhibitors must follow both General and Health Rules and Regulations.
2. All vegetables in all classes must be grown and exhibited by the member.
3. Paper plates and wicker holders are provided for all classes except 1 and 2.
4. Exhibitors are reminded to obtain "Exhibiting Flowers, Fruits and Vegetables" Guide from Extension Office (410-778-1661), for judging criteria.
5. **All 4-H entries must be labeled with name of item on plate, container or with sticker.**
6. Artistic displays will be judged by crafts or home arts judges.

1. Display of Vegetables: Entry will consist of a group of not less than 5 different vegetables arranged artistically. Displays will be judged on quality of individual vegetable, artistic arrangement of display and number of varieties of vegetables used. Greens may be left on vegetable.

### SECTION 2: FARM CROPS

4-H Chairpersons: Alan Debnam

1. **ALL** hay, grain, haylage, and silage **must be grown on farm, leased or owned by parents/employer of 4-H'er or open class exhibitor.**
2. Hay must be cured below 20% moisture. Alfalfa, clover or Lespedeza hay with more than 10% grass will be classified mixed. An entry shall consist of a bundle approximately 18" by 18" by 6" and should be securely tied 8 ways for hanging up for display.
3. **NO** purchased hay or grains may be exhibited.
4. Silage and Haylage **MUST** be in a clear gallon jar with a lid.
5. Age division Champions awarded in Hay and Straw, Grain and Silage, Stalk Corn, and other agriculture products and 1 overall grand and reserve champion.

### SECTION 3: PLANTS & FLOWERS

1. All exhibitors must follow General Rules and Regulations.
2. All entries must be grown and exhibited by member, except plant materials for arrangements and corsages which can be purchased and arranged by exhibitor.
3. All cut flower branch stems must have stem leaves attached.
4. Potted plants, except in hanging basket classes, must be in pots not to exceed 8 inches top diameter. Dish garden containers may not exceed 20 inches maximum width. Hanging baskets must be able to hang. Exhibits exceeding these limits will be disqualified.
5. House plants and terrariums should have been established in the pot or container at least one month.
6. All entries must be labeled on container, written on cup or sticker with name of flower.

### CUT FLOWERS

1. Aster - China Double - 3 blooms, one variety and color
2. Aster - Pom Pom - 3 blooms, one variety and color
3. Gladiolus - 1 spike with two or more stem leaves attached.
4. Marigold - large orange varieties - 3 stems, one bloom each, same variety.
5. Marigold - large non-orange varieties - 3 stems, one bloom each, same variety.
6. Marigold - small flowering - single colored - 3 separate branches with a minimum of one bloom per branch, same variety
7. Marigold - small flowering - multi colored - 3 separate branches with a minimum of one bloom per branch, same variety
8. Petunia - 3 branches with a minimum of one bloom per branch, one variety - single
9. Petunia - 3 branches with a minimum of 1 bloom per branch, one variety-double
10. Chrysanthemum - 3 stems of 1 color, 1 variety
11. Zinnia - Pom Pom type, 3 blooms same variety and color
12. Zinnia - Cactus type, 3 blooms same variety and color
13. Zinnia - Any other miniature variety, 3 blooms same variety and color
14. Zinnia - Any other non-miniature variety, 3 blooms same variety and color

15. Dahlia - Giant or large - 1 bloom must be disbranched
16. Dahlia - Medium - 3 blooms same variety and color must be disbranched
17. Dahlia - Small - 3 blooms same variety and color must be disbranched
18. Black-eyed Susan - 3 blooms, 1 variety
19. Ageratum - 5 stalks
20. Cockscomb (celosia) - plume type, 1 spike
21. Cockscomb (celosia) - crested type, 1 spike
22. Strawflower - 3 blooms
23. Rose - any variety
24. Hydrangea - 1 bloom
25. Sunflower - 3 blooms, not field or seed variety
26. Other Cut Flower - Must label with variety name

62. Gift Basket: Include at least 5 items in a basket or decorated box that could be used for a gift appropriate to the flower enthusiast.
