The Real History of State Fair Food Innovation

Excerpt from *Home / Baking from Scratch*, October 27, 2021. By Amanda Bright

The Meat Biscuit [See patent below] – invented in 1850 by Gail Borden Jr. – was an attempt to provide travelers during the California Gold Rush with lightweight food to carry with them on the difficult journey. Mr. Borden wanted to make portable 'meat glue' to aid friends who were traveling to California and needed vittles [food] to carry from Texas. Using a large kettle, he boiled down 120 pounds of veal into 10 pounds of extract (today we would call this beef or bone broth), then mixed it with good flour, rolled it, cut it into biscuits and baked it.

The meat biscuit could be eaten as a biscuit, or made into a portable soup. According to Mr. Borden, "Two pounds of it will supply one man for a week, and fourteen pounds will support him for a month." He patented the formula and took it to London's Great Exposition in 1851, winning a gold medal.



In 1853, Borden also created sweetened condensed milk in an attempt to create a shelf stable milk product. The milk later became a lifesaver for soldiers during the Civil War. He opened two factories to produce his product, but both ultimately failed. Borden was determined, and it was not until the third factory opened in 1864 that his condensed milk, sold under the name Eagle Brand, eventually caught on. This product is still sold 159 years later at supermarkets featuring the Borden name.

Editor's Note: Patent No. 7066, dated February 5, 1850

"The nature of my invention consists in extracting the nutritious parts of flesh or animal meat of every description and combining this concentrated extract with flour or vegetable meal, and baking the two substances in an oven, thereby forming a portable desiccated soup-bread containing a large amount of the most important alimentary substance in a very small bulk and convenient form, well adapted to seafaring purposes, travelers, hospitals, and also for family use, which will save the trouble and expense of much cooking."

Maryland 4-H Horse Judging and Hippology Contest

June 10, Howard County Fairgrounds

Horse Judging - In this event, youth make a careful evaluation of horses in a class, judging and placing them against an accepted ideal for the breed or discipline shown. Contests usually include halter and performance classes.

The Hippology Contest mixes a range of educational activities offered in the 4-H Horse Program into one event. The contest includes:

Judging. Judging may consist of placing live classes of horses or classes shown on slides or video.

Written Examination. Written Examination consists of questions posed in a variety of ways. For example, multiple choice, fill in, definitions, true and false. Topics generally

are limited to genetics, nutrition, conformation, health, behavior and history.

Identification and Anatomy. This activity test the knowledge of anatomy of the horse, breeds, breed history, colors, color patterns and equine activities. Contestants can be asked to identify tack, equipment, feed samples, grains, or hays.

Animal Husbandry and Quality Assurance is due July 15 (https://ahqa.umd.edu/).

You will need to complete the program if:

- You are new to 4-H (any age) OR
- You are 11 as of January 1st (moving from junior to intermediate) OR
- You are 14 as of January 1st (moving from intermediate to senior) OR
- Are an intermediate or senior with a new project animal

Level 5 & 6 Diamond Clover Plans & Reports

This is a reminder to all 4-H'ers working on earning Level 5 or 6 Diamond Clover Awards.

Fair Ticket Pricing

As a 4-H'er, if you enter exhibits at the fair, you will get a free weekly pass!

As in the past, free and reduced-price entry tickets will be made available to 4-H members and their families. Purchasing can occur when you enter exhibits online or weekdays at the Fair Office between 8:00 AM and 4:00 PM beginning July 22 or between the hours of 8:00 AM and 12:30 PM on one of the Volunteer Workdays on Saturday, July 22, 29 & August 5. After these dates, tickets are only available at the advertised price.

The following free tickets for Fair admission will be provided to 4-H who enter exhibits:

- 1. 4-H indoor exhibitors and those with poultry, rabbits, pet show, and dog show will be provided with 1 season pass that includes free parking at Perry Pkwy.
- 2. 4-H exhibitors with horses, beef, dairy, swine, goats, and sheep will be provided with 1 season pass including free parking at all entrances.
- 3. 4-H exhibitor families with horses, beef, dairy, swine, goats, and sheep that are not Life Members will be provided with an additional season pass including free parking at all entrances.

The following tickets are available for purchase by 4-H member families until 12:30 PM on the final Volunteer Saturday Workday.

- 1. Season Pass that includes Free Parking at Perry Parkway only - \$50.00
- 2. Season Pass special pass for nonexhibitor sibling of a 4-H member (age 12-18) Perry Parkway only - \$18.00
- 3. 1 Day ticket 4-H Family, Free Parking at Perry Parkway only \$10.00

Fair Volunteers Needed!

Please remember to sign-up to volunteer at the fair. Every single 4-H volunteer is very important and very much appreciated!

Youth volunteers: This is a great opportunity to earn Student Service Learning (SSL) hours towards graduation. The Fair uses an SSL volunteer hour recording form that you will need to complete and turn in to them no later than the close of business on the Monday after the Fair.

You also have the opportunity to become a life member of the Montgomery County Agricultural Fairgrounds and get a free life

member pass to the fair (visit the fairgrounds website for information on this program:

https://www.mcagfair.com/general-information/volunteer-information/ and click on the Volunteer Information tab.

Each Fair workday you will need to find the unique QR code for clocking in and out that day only. These codes will be at the Gazebo, the Heritage building and each Department. You MUST clock in and out to get credit for your SSL hours

- Only people who are 12 and up can receive hours towards a life membership.
- You must choose one. You cannot receive SSL hours and hours towards a life membership at the same time.

Workdays begin at 8:00 AM, department superintendents will determine when the workday ends, usually between 12:30 PM and 2:00 PM. If you arrive and sign in by

9:00 AM, you will receive one free lunch ticket. Do not forget to ask for it.

Pet Show Requirement

The Pet Show is a super fun casual dress contest. Pets entered should be friendly and have no history of aggression.

ALL PET SHOW EXHIBITORS: The 4-H'er and a parent or guardian must attend one of the quality assurance meetings held in the Heritage building at 8:30 AM sharp on one of the workdays.

Please check the fair catalog for all requirements of pets entered in the pet show. All required identification and testing requirements/certificates for all species will be enforced the same as any other livestock event at the fair. This could be tattoos, RFD tags, etc.

Dogs and Cats MUST have a current rabies certificate at check in. Rabies tags will NOT be accepted as proof of current vaccine.

Please read the rules carefully for everything, including promotion. Pets shown in the pet show cannot be shown in any other fair event.

Entering Your Work At The Fair

4-H Indoor and demonstration entry registrations must be entered online by July 20. Each exhibit must have a pre-printed tag firmly attached to it on entry night.

An exhibitor may enter only one exhibit per class.

Exhibitors are responsible for verifying the accuracy of their entries. If you have a problem or correction, you MUST contact the Fair Office in person or by phone at 301-926-3100. It is highly recommended that all exhibitors bring their On-Line Entry Receipt with them to entry night.

Monitor the Montgomery County Agricultural fair website for information on when you can start entering exhibits online.

When entering online, please make sure you are entering in the desired department—4-H or Open. Please print a receipt for your records.

If you are not able to enter your exhibits using the online system, paper entry forms are available in the back of the fair catalog. Please mail all paper entry forms to the Fair Office (NOT THE 4-H OFFICE): Montgomery Co. Agricultural Fair, 16 Chestnut St., Gaithersburg, MD 20877.

- NO LATE DROP-OFFS WILL BE ACCEPTED!
- Pick up day—Sunday, August 20 from <u>11:00 AM 2:00 PM</u>. <u>All exhibits unclaimed by Sunday, August 20 at 2:00 PM will become the property of the fair. EXHIBITS WILL NOT BE TAKEN BACK TO THE 4-H OFFICE.

- The Fair or the 4-H Office will NOT be responsible for any damage to an exhibit while at the fair.

Once the fairground receives all 4-H entry registrations, they generate the display tags for each entry. Leaders will be notified when tags are ready to pick up.

Display tags must accompany each indoor entry at the fair. You must make an appointment to pick up your tags at the 4-H office. Alternatively, you can pick up your tags at the Fairground on entry day. If you wish to volunteer to help sort tags, contact Jeannine Shriver at jshriver@umd.edu.

Exhibits without tags will not be accepted.

No tags will be issued on entry day if the name of the exhibitor is not on the Fair exhibitor entry list.

Booths and Banners State Guidelines

Please remember, the <u>State Fair guidelines</u> for entering booths and banners are different from the Montgomery County Fair.

Banners: ALL clubs may enter their banners in the State Fair. However, Clubs must enter them themselves using the online State Fair entry system.

Booths: ONLY County Fair champion "State Fair Themed Booths" can be entered at the State Fair.
