The Month of March 2021

We have made it through yet another month of this crazy pandemic! Three months into 2021 and I think we are getting a better handle of the drastic change. Sometimes the best way to thrive is by experiencing chaos and learning how to be resilient. This may seem like a never-ending tribulation, but finding a purpose for positivity can be very rewarding. Spring is nearing, so get out and enjoy nature! 4-Hers start getting busy themselves in the warming months as well. Members are deciding on which projects they would like to have this year and begin finding the best ways to complete their projects. Setting goals for projects can help members stay organized and motivated, but also provide a major source of satisfaction when those goals are completed.

Beginning the record books creates a guide on how to work through projects. Now still in the early stages of the year, members can document their chosen projects, decide on project goals, and begin tracking expenses. Record keeping is especially important for livestock raisers. Those who have livestock projects are beginning to really get involved with their animals in hopes of a successful fall fair. It is best to begin working with your animal from the time they are very young, so that they can be comfortable with their owner.

One activity that is being endorsed by the local 4-H office is the broiler chick project. This project involves raising chickens from the time they are born to the time they are from 6 to 8 weeks old. The owners of these chicks are responsible for keeping records everyday documenting the progress of the chicks. This project effectively teaches members how to nurture a chick from its primary days, and how to be able to relinquish your animal when it is time for butchering.

But before you start on your projects, you have to make sure you are registered!! Registering for 4-H is simple and very important. Members were asked to enroll before March 1st. If you would still like to join 4-H, you are welcome to participate anytime throughout the year, and once you become a member you are asked to enroll annually.

Other local activities have taken place throughout the last few months. These include Shooting Stars (Archery & Air Rifle) Club virtual meets, a Launch into Leadership (activities involving youth in leading 4-H activities) Session, a dairy fun day, a dog fun day, Diamond Clover participation deadlines, the State dairy skillathon, a state dairy bowl, a public speaking workshop and more have all happened or been scheduled to take place in the the near future. Amazingly, although the pandemic has made gathering and collaborating tougher, 4-H leaders and members have continued to show their spirit and support through much participation!

A sign of thanks for that participation will be displayed at the Annual 4-H Banquet on March 13. Here, members with their families and leaders

The Month of April 2021

The Month of May 2021

In Southern Maryland, the weather has been spectacular. As the saying goes, April showers bring May flowers. That phrase sure has followed through for us this spring. Although we have had a lot of rainfall and some cool nights, the daytime has provided lovely temperatures. Many students are counting down days until the last week of school and the first day of summer. Crabbing season opened in April and boats are becoming more popular on the river.

In terms of 4-H, members are growing busier and busier. By this time, members who are participating in livestock projects have typically begun raising their animals. The Market Animal Weigh-in for livestock is currently scheduled for May 22nd. At this event, members register and weigh their animals. Around fair time there will be another weigh-in to enter the livestock for the shows and auctions. The animal's weight is important for the owner to know to keep them healthy and track the weight. During the show at the fair, the judge may ask the owner questions concerning their animal. A popular question the judge may ask is approximately what the rate of gain is for the animal, so it is important that the 4-Her know this information.

Members will also be participating in the broiler chick project this year. The chicks arrived around the middle of April. These chicks are designed to grow at a very fast rate for quick growth and a sooner butchering date.

In other news, the air rifle program planned for its first practice of 2021 in late April. A team participated in the Maryland 4-H State Dairy Bowl on April 17th. The Horse Communications Contest registration deadline ended April 21st. For the contest, members are asked to record their speeches. A 2021 Spring Show will take place in Charles County of Southern Maryland from June 4 through June 6. The entry deadline for the show is May 26, 2021.

State virtual activity clubs are in progress. The club topics include historic arts and crafts, learning about travel opportunities with 4-H, a sewing club, and a book club.

The St. Mary's 4-H Day Camp will run July 7-9 with limited spots. Many fun activities and learning opportunities are held at the camp. We have had an incredibly fun time participating in the past, but with the CoronaVirus we were unable to attend in person.

The Maryland State 4-H office is educating teens in becoming Agriculture Innovators to teach other youth about the program in the summer. The program's topic is about the climate and how youth and Agriculture are helping the climate.

The Maryland 4-H Foundation is offering the opportunity for academic scholarships to Maryland 4-H members and Maryland 4-H alum pursuing post-secondary education at a college, university, or post-secondary technical training program. The

Maryland 4-H Foundation awards an average of \$50,000 in scholarships annually. The entry deadline to apply is June 15th,

Lastly, the County fair in St. Mary's County is scheduled this year! This has been a huge relief and joy for 4-H to hear especially. The fair will be held from September 23 through the 26th. Although many members had fun participating in an alternate auction last year through the Bustin' Out of the Barn show, we are very excited to be going back to our traditional show ring. So, if you are available that exciting weekend in September, consider visiting beautiful Southern Maryland and seeing our annual county fair. We will be thrilled to welcome you. knowledge about equine. The classes available include fine arts, photography, and visual arts. Registration and entry uploads for this contest closes on July 12th through 4-H Online.

For those interested in woodland activities, youth from the Maryland 4-H Forestry Club are welcome to take part in the National 4-H Forestry Invitational. The event will be held at Jackson's Mill State 4-H Camp in West Virginia. The three day competitions allow members from age 14-18 to display their forestry skills and knowledge.

The Tudor Hall 4-H club held a Holiday workshop available to all 4-H clubs in St. Mary's County on December 11th. This workshop provided a chance for the 4-H community to join together and celebrate the holiday season by making crafts and gifts. A prize was even awarded to the person with the most
