



Fair Trivia:

1. Who invented fairs in the US?

In the US, agricultural fairs did not begin to catch on until the early 19th century, when the first American fair was held in Pittsfield, Massachusetts. This early fair, organized by Elkanah Watson in 1807, was a small affair consisting of only sheep shearing demonstrations.

2. What is the oldest fair in the world?

The historical roots of the Frankfurt Trade Fair date back to 1240 when Emperor Frederick II granted the city the trade fair privilege. This makes it the oldest fair in the world.

3. What is the most popular ride at a fair?

The carousel remains a carnival staple worldwide. The ride consists of a rotating platform with seats that move up and down.

Have you ever wondered why a carousel horse's head faces to the right? The reason is that the American carousel spins counterclockwise; therefore, the right side is seen more than the left side.

Diamond Clover Level 6 Proposal Applications and Final Report

Before you submit your proposal to the PORTAL, all NEW Diamond Clover – Level 6 proposals must be reviewed and approved by the County Educator and the Diamond Clover Advisory Committee. Your PROPOSAL to the County Office is due by September 15, 2022. The approved proposal is due to the State 4-H Office by September 30, 2022.

After the Educator approves your proposal, you must fill in all information, and upload all documents to the PORTAL ONLY at the link below.

Once you have completed your approved Diamond Clover Project and you have received all appropriate signatures on the final report cover page, upload your Diamond Clover level 6 report in PDF and Word Version, and support materials to the PORTAL by September 30.

On August 19, 2022, at the 73th Montgomery County (MOCO) Agricultural Fair, the Fair Queen, Ms. Layla Shepard met a special visitor, Ms. Vicky (Barkley) Tant, the 1977 MOCO Fair Queen. Layla and Vicky shared their 4-H stories across half a century.

Vicky came all the way from North Carolina to Gaithersburg just for the 4-H indoor exhibitions. She was happy to see the active 4-H animal clubs in our County, as well as the open exhibitors achieving the goal of maintaining the agricultural aspect of the MOCO Fair. Vicky indicated that she was very excited to see the amazing 4-H exhibitions. The exhibits covered 90 categories, including science in STEM education. Vicky shared her 4-H story with some 4-H volunteers. 45 years ago, her favorite projects were sewing, and clothing. She also enjoyed craft making, room decorating, and designing and making toys. The 4-H club activities taught her many life skills, such as how to separate the yolk and the egg white, which she uses when she bakes cakes today.
