Maryland 4-H Horse Judging and Hippology Contest

June 10, Howard County Fairgrounds

Horse Judging - In this event, youth make a careful evaluation of horses in a class, judging and placing them against an accepted ideal for the breed or discipline shown. Contests usually include halter and performance classes.

The Hippology Contest mixes a range of educational activities offered in the 4-H Horse Program into one event. The contest includes:

Judging. Judging may consist of placing live classes of horses or classes shown on slides or video.

Written Examination. Written Examination consists of questions posed in a variety of

ways. For example, multiple choice, fill in, definitions, true and false. Topics generally are limited to genetics, nutrition, conformation, health, behavior and history.

Identification and Anatomy. This activity test the knowledge of anatomy of the horse, breeds, breed history, colors, color patterns and equine activities. Contestants can be asked to identify tack, equipment, feed samples, grains, or hays.
