

The personal essay should be no more than 2 pages and should answer the essay topic below. Additional details and requirements for the essay can be found in the Portfolio Program document.

Essay Question for 2021 Leadership Trips:

Explain the importance and power of 4-H involvement through connections during trying times.

For the following Out-of-State Leadership trips, you will need to download, fill out, save and submit to your county 4-H educator for review and approval.

4-H STEM Challenge Trip to Mars Base Camp

Do you know that if you were to go on a sunset walk on Mars, the sun appears to be half the size that we see on Earth and the sunset would be blue!

Do you know that the tallest planetary mountain in our solar system is Olympus Mons, which is on Mars?

On November 25, 2020, the Lucky Clovers presented a virtual 4-H STEM Challenge activity about planning a trip to Mars Base Camp.

The purpose of the Challenge was to explore sending a mission to Mars and learning about what it would take to sustain life in space. The event was packed with different activities including a Landing Zone Surveyor game, a Mars Trivia game, and Building a Rover to go on a mock exploratory mission on Mars. The activities were designed to teach participants about the Engineering Design Process, and how to use critical thinking, creativity, problem solving and teamwork to complete the challenges.

The Landing Zone Surveyor, simulated mission to Mars, helped provide an overview of some of the challenges involved in getting to Mars, and what features have been discovered on Mars from past missions.

In the Discovery phase, teams shared information about their orbiter or landing site with the rest of the group.

In the Reflection phase, the group used critical thinking skills to consider which of their landing sites would be good places to potentially send a rover or people to.

The Martian Trivia Kahoot activity tested everyone's knowledge about Mars.

In Red Planet Odyssey activity, participants were given rover kits that they assembled with help from the leaders of the break-out rooms. In this activity, the participants were introduced to the concept of the engineering design process by building a rover and going on an exploratory mission on Mars. Throughout the assembly and exploration, the participants discussed how the Engineering Design Process is a cycle where you have to identify the problem, research ideas, create a plan based on the best ideas, create a working model, test the model and improve it.

After the rovers were built, the challenge was to navigate the rovers from one part of Mars to another using different obstacles that mimicked the features that could be found on Mars. The activity proved to be a challenge, because some of the rovers had a tendency to pull to one side if the axle couldn't move freely.

After the activities, the participants spent time reflecting on what everyone had learned and how the engineering design process was helpful in building the rover and exploring Mars. The members also discussed careers that would be important in space exploration and in living on Mars.

The club is planning to present another STEM challenge next year, so contact the Lucky Clovers in the early 2021 fall if you would like to participate in the next challenge.
