

#### **SNAP-Ed In Action!**

#### **Nourishing Neighbors:**

This summer our SNAP-Ed Project Leader, Kenzie Mousch partnered with the Appalachian Farm & Food Alliance and assisted with the Nourishing Neighbor Produce Distribution & Resource Exchange. At this exchange, she educated on ways to incorporate seasonal fruits and vegetables into healthy and nutritious meals for all. Resources were given to attendees on ways to use the produce in their boxes like recipes, proper storage, and cooking. A food demo was conducted using recipes from our <u>EAT SMART</u> database. Below were the specific recipes that were demonstrated this month:

Cucumber Salad Corn Salad

#### **Tomato Festival:**

At the 2025 Tomato Festival, Kenzie provided Tomato-inspired recipes and demonstrated a version of Cowboy Caviar. There are many different ways to cook Cowboy Caviar but she used a lime and vegetable oil base recipe that uses cherry tomatoes instead of canned tomato puree. She suggested cutting the tomatoes and removing the seeds to reduce the amount of liquid in your dish. This will ensure the final product has a thicker texture and not runny!

### Busy Garrett County Fair Week



The Garrett County Fair is one of the best weeks of summer, and also one of the busiest weeks of the summer for 4-H. Each day, multiple 4-H events are happening, where youth get to show off all their hard work. From different livestock, equine, rabbit, and poultry shows, to fashion revue and tractor driving, there is always something to watch and participate in. Even though it's always a full schedule, there is always something new. This year, UME 4-H hosted exciting additions to the fair week including the UMD Insect Zoo and two school group tours.

## Creepy, Crawly Insects Visit Garrett County Fair

Todd Waters from the UMD Department of Entomology brought the the Insect Zoo to the fair to provide a unique opportunity for the community to learn about the diversity of arthropods and their importance in our ecosystems. The exhibit included giant leaf bugs, stick bugs, a native hercules beetle larvae, blue death feigning beetles, giant millipedes, rolly pollies, the giant vinegaroon, jungle centipede, giant forest scorpion, friendly tarantulas, and more. Many visitors were excited to get an up close look and even touch and hold them, others admired from a distance at the odd creatures visiting Garrett County. Either way, visitors had an experience to remember for a long time.

### Learning Day At The Garrett County Fair

UME 4-H and Master Gardeners partnered with Grantsville Elementary and Yough Glades Elementary to host students as part of their community schools program. Students and teachers learned about a variety of plant and vegetable identification skills, and got to try first hand to judge a sampling of vegetables just like a fair judge would. Students also got to learn about pollinators, make a craft, and visit the UMD Insect Zoo to learn about insects from other parts of the world. The school tours also got to watch a dairy cow be milked out, enjoyed tours of the animals hosted by 4-H members, and got to walk around and visit the exhibit barns. Students had the full fair experience with enjoying lunch at the fair and ice cream.

The Pollinator Education Corner was set up again in the 4-H Exhibit building thanks to contributions from Enbridge.

The Pollinator Education corner had something for all ages to engage with. Flower models, insect samples, and insect life cycle models allowed visitors to see and learn about a variety of pollinators and their role in our environment. Educational handouts and posters allowed fair goers to visually recognize important native plants, and get information on upcoming UME programs that might also be of interest.

Kids and adults alike were able to play pollinator theme games, complete puzzles, read books together, and make their own insect antennae headbands to take home. Wildflower seed packets were also distributed for free so everyone can help provide valuable resources for our important pollinators.

#### 4-H Indoor Exhibits

Each year is exciting to see the creative items you have made over the year when they enter their indoor exhibits into the 4-H building at the fair. From the historical staples like produce, flowers, and canning, to new trends in crafts, artwork, and jewelry. Photography and crafts continue to be popular categories, along with 4-H club booths. Entries are judged, and a Best of Show is selected in each department. In a matter of hours, our 4-H indoor exhibit building was full with over 900 entries. The following day, every single entry is examined, judged, and awarded ribbons. We are so grateful for the 60+ community volunteers who help make entry day and judging day a smooth success for our 4-H members.

4-H indoor exhibits continue to offer youth a multitude of benefits, including skill development, personal growth, and community engagement. These projects foster practical skills through hands-on experiences with techniques specific to each craft, such as measuring ingredients for baked goods, cutting and finishing in woodworking, or using appropriate tools and safety to create metal work. Intricate embroidery, diamond art, and crochet improve fine motor skills and dexterity. In these projects, members can personalize their projects, fostering creativity and problem-solving skills. Working with different materials enhances critical thinking. These exhibits can be time-consuming and tedious, requiring patience and perseverance, and instill a strong work ethic.

#### **Fashion Revue**

The 4-H Fashion Revue is an event growing out of the 4-H Clothing and Sewing projects. It is an opportunity for 4-H members to exhibit and model a garment, either purchased or made by the member. After members interview with a panel of judges to share about their outfit, youth model the garment on stage to a narration self-written. This event helps youth learn about using money wisely, laundering, mending, sewing, communication, and developing poise and confidence. These

historical skills are still just as necessary in today's world. This year's event had 12 youth members modeling 14 garments.
