"I pledge my head to clearer thinking, my heart to greater loyalty, my hands to larger service, and my health to better living, for my club, my community, my country, and my world."

During National 4-H Week, we celebrate a program that is near and dear to many of us in Garrett County. From Oct. 5 to 11, millions of 4-H members, alumni, volunteers and supporters across the nation will come together to celebrate the accomplishments of 4-H.

Does participating in 4-H really make a difference in the lives of young people today? Those of us involved in the 4-H program, see this every day in action and can easily say YES 4-H makes a difference. The research shows it too. According to the National 4-H Council, youth who participate in 4-H Programs are three times more likely to participate in community service; 2 times more likely to report living life with intentionality and purpose and two times more likely to have the goal of being a leader.

Alumni surveys prove 4-H makes a difference as well. 4-H alumni are more likely to be personally satisfied in life, more satisfied socially and emotionally, more fulfilled by their jobs and financial security, and make a difference and love their work than non-alums. It also showed that 4-H alumni are more involved in leadership and volunteerism, and have a higher rate of completion of higher education.

Whether a 4-H alum or not, 4-H would not exist without incredible volunteer network. Thank you for your investment in our young people.

As we approach National 4-H Week, we hope you too will reflect on the incredible impact of this valuable youth development program in our community.

Educators Present At College & Me Program For Garrett County Fifth Graders


University of Maryland Extension Educators selected for the Garrett College and Me Program include Ashley Bodkins (Master Gardener Coordinator) and Lacie Ashby and Karen Wood (4-H Educators). They have been chosen to present at the College and Me Program at Garrett College which takes place from September 2025 through May 2026. Their session entitled "Exploring Insects through 3D Printing" aims to engage all fifth graders in Garrett County by helping them to understand the significance of insects while allowing them to create their own 3D models to take home.

The program inspires young minds through a blend of hands-on activities and technology. By incorporating 3D printing into entomology lessons, students are introduced to the potential of modern tools and imagine future applications inspiring them to think beyond traditional career paths and consider new possibilities in science and technology.

Good Time of Year To Collect Soil Samples



Let us start planning for the 2026 growing season. After fall harvest is the perfect time to update soil samples from your fields. Soil samples are good for up to three years while manure samples can be used for up to two years depending on the source. The extension office can provide you with the required documents for you to send out your samples. As a reminder, be sure to record

your crop yields throughout the harvest season. Be on the lookout for documents detailing needed information for your update in the mail this fall.
