The Woods in Your Backyard online course - Spring 2026

March 9 – May 18, 2026

Our self-directed, non-credit course runs 10 weeks. The online format lets you access the content when it's convenient for you, without worrying about attending evening classes or weekend workshops. The course will help landowners convert lawn to natural areas and enhance stewardship of existing natural areas. Based on the guide of the same name, the course provides strategies to landowners of small parcels of land (1-10 acres) that improve the stewardship of their property for personal enjoyment and environmental quality. It uses a hands-on learning approach to help participants develop and implement a plan for their property. Activities include how to map habitat areas, understand basic ecological principles about woodland and wildlife, choose and implement a few habitat management projects, and how to set a timetable and record your progress. Online discussion groups will allow participants to interact with others taking the course. A certificate of completion is awarded when all assignments are completed.

CSN webinar: Assessing the Effectiveness of Green Stormwater Infrastructure for Addressing Stormwater Management Goals at the Watershed Scale

Tuesday, March 10, 2026, 12pm

The primary goal of this research project was to employ a suite of state-of-the-art hydrologic methods to assess the aggregated, watershed-scale effectiveness of using green stormwater infrastructure as part of new suburban residential development in north-central Howard County, Maryland. The field-based study was conducted over 5½ years (2019-2025) on a small (0.31 mi²) watershed drained by an unnamed tributary to the Little Patuxent River; runoff and water quality responses were monitored through 1) the “pre-GSI” period, 2) the period “during GSI” implementation, and the “post-GSI” period of development. An adjacent watershed (Plumtree Branch, 0.82 mi²), developed using traditional stormwater management, was used as a hydroclimatic control.

Unity Gardens Spring 2026 Grant

Deadline: Wednesday, April 1, 2026

Unity Gardens will be accepting applications to fund the installation of native plant gardens in community spaces in Anne Arundel County. Non-profit organizations such as schools, churches, community centers, scout troops, garden clubs and other qualified organizations can receive grants of up to \$1,000 for native perennial gardens, \$2,000 for native meadows and \$3,000 for projects comprised of at least 75% native trees and shrubs. Maryland Native Plant Society Research Grants

The Maryland Native Plant Society is funding research grants of up to \$4,000 for empirical, hypothesis-driven research relevant to Maryland's native plants. Projects that concern plants or habitats outside Maryland will be considered if the results of the project will add to the body of knowledge about plants and habitats in Maryland, or an appreciable portion of the plant specimens or research sites come from or are located in Maryland. The project may also concern the effects of invasive non-native plants on Maryland native plants and habitats.

Awards Announced

September 2026 (anticipated)

The National Fish and Wildlife Foundation (NFWF), in partnership with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the federal-state Chesapeake Bay Program (CBP) partnership, is soliciting proposals through the Chesapeake Bay Stewardship Fund to protect and restore water quality and habitats of the Chesapeake Bay and its tributary rivers and streams.

Through the Small Watershed Grants (SWG) program, delivered in partnership with EPA and the CBP partnership, NFWF is soliciting proposals for projects within the Chesapeake Bay watershed that promote voluntary, community-based efforts to protect and restore the diverse and vital habitats of the Chesapeake Bay and its tributary rivers and streams. NFWF will award funding through two distinct funding opportunities.

- SWG Implementation (SWG-I) grants of \$150,000-750,000 will be awarded for projects that result in direct, on-the-ground actions to protect and restore water quality, species, and habitats in the Bay watershed. NFWF expects all SWG-I proposals to have any necessary preliminary designs completed for proposed activities by the time of application.
- SWG Planning and Technical Assistance (SWG-PTA) grants up to \$150,000 will be awarded for projects that enhance local capacity to advance future on-the-ground actions, consistent with SWG Program priorities, through community-based assessment, planning, design, and other technical assistance-oriented activities.

Chesapeake Watershed Investments for Landscape Defense (WILD) Grants 2026 Request for Proposals

Deadline: Thursday, April 9, 2026

The National Fish and Wildlife Foundation (NFWF), in partnership with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, is soliciting proposals through the Chesapeake Bay Stewardship Fund to protect and restore water quality and habitats of the Chesapeake Bay and its tributary rivers and streams.

Through the 2026 Chesapeake Watershed Investment for Landscape Defense (WILD) grants program, NFWF will award funding through three distinct funding opportunities:

WILD Implementation grants of \$75,000 to \$500,000 will be awarded for projects that result in direct and measurable on-the-ground actions to restore, conserve, and connect fish and wildlife habitats.

WILD Collaborative Conservation grants of up to \$200,000 will be awarded for projects that support and enhance the capacity of partnerships, networks, and other collaborative models working collaboratively to advance place-based, landscape-scale, and cross-jurisdictional habitat restoration, conservation, and connectivity outcomes.

WILD Planning and Technical Assistance (PTA) grants of up to \$75,000 will be awarded for projects that help advance future on-the-ground actions to restore, conserve, and connect fish and wildlife habitats and related conservation benefits in the Bay watershed through community-based assessment, planning, design, and other technical assistance-oriented activities.
